The sixth Harry Potter book had been released in the heat of July, and I pored through its pages, completely immersed, and totally unaware of the melodies floating through the studio air 250 miles away, across the lake from my hometown.

I think a lot about what it would've been like, to be there at the beginning. The November 2005 release show for Marvin's Marvelous Mechanical Museum was held at the Double Door, twenty minutes down the highway from my house. From age three months, I took multiple trips per year to visit family in the same Michigan suburbs where 4/5 of Tally Hall grew up. I wonder if I ever crossed paths with them, unknowing. I wonder the kind of person I'd be if Tally Hall had been as big a part of my childhood as Harry Potter, or They Might Be Giants, or Neopets. After all these years, that spark of excitement and originality that made the world first pay attention to Tally Hall is shining brightly as ever, and nothing makes me happier.

Tally Hall used to be a place, and then it became a band. And right now, I think, it's returned to being a place—just not a physical one. It's a liminal space, a spiritual location. Tally Hall is where you go when you're far away from where you grew up, but you want to feel at home. It's where you can be surrounded by friends when you're feeling alone. And Tally Hall is where you can freely imagine yourself as the person that you want to be, but aren't quite yet.

You'll get there. We'll all get there. By the time we make it, maybe Tally Hall will have announced a new tour.

But in the meantime, I think I'll listen to Marvin's Marvelous Mechanical Museum. Maybe you'll join me?



Well, I remembered Andrew from the "Perfect" video, but that was it.






